

Metropolitan Baptist Church History 1850 - 2000 (Abridged)



The Metropolitan Church is the oldest black Baptist church in Western Pennsylvania. It was form known as First Colored Regular Baptist Church, Zion Baptist Church, and Green Street Baptist Church before becoming Metropolitan Baptist Church.

According to the minutes of the 11th Annual Meeting of the Pittsburgh Baptist Association, "the First Colored Church of Allegheny City (now the North Side of Pittsburgh) made application, and was received as a member of the Pittsburgh Association and given the hand of fellowship by the Moderator, the Reverend Samuel Williams on June 2, 1850." This Session of the Association was held with the Mars Hill Baptist Church, Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, June 1st, 2nd and 3rd, 1850 A.D. The statistical report of the Association records that the First Colored Baptist Church consisted of 20 members, pastured by the Reverend Philip Broadwater.

At the 12^{th} Annual Session, held with the Elizabethtown Baptist Church of Allegheny, Pennsylvania on May 31st, and June 1^{st} , 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} 1851, the First Colored Baptist Church reported a total membership of 39 members pastured by the Reverend C. Long.

On June 6th, 7th and 8th, 1852 the 13th Annual Session was held with the McKeesport Baptist Church of Allegheny County, Pennsylvania. A total membership of 35 was reported by the First Colored Baptist Church of Allegheny City. However, the Church was without a pastor.

The minutes of the 14th Annual Session, held on June 4th, 1853, with the Freeport Baptist Church, recorded "no delegates from the First Colored Baptist Church, but the Church was still considered an Association member"

From 1854 through 1867, the First Colored Baptist Church was not listed, nor was there any explanation or reason for the Church's not being represented.

It can be assumed or presumed that the membership scattered and/or joined other Baptist churches, particularly the Sandusky Street Baptist Church (white).

There is a definite lack of recorded information regarding the First Colored Baptist Church from 1854 until 1868, when the minutes of the 29th Annual Session of the Pittsburgh Baptist Association held with the McKeesport Baptist Church state, "The Committee on admissions reported the First Colored Baptist Church, Allegheny City, reapplied for fellowship and recommended their reception. The letters from the Church were read and the hand of fellowship was extended to delegates Deacon S.A. Neale, Wesley Johnson, and M.B. Sloan, Pastor, by the Moderator, the Reverend T.S. Hill." At that time, a total membership of 23 members was reported. There were also statistics regarding the Sunday School. There were 50 scholars, 5 teachers," and 150 volumes in the library. The Superintendent at that time was W.T. Brown.

Page 21 of the History of the Sandusky Street Baptist Church reveals, "16 members were dismissed from the Church in 1868 to unite with others in forming the First Colored Baptist Church of Allegheny City. These 16 were:

We can only conjecture that "the others" mentioned by the Sandusky Street Baptist Church must have represented the descendants of the original 20 members who established the First Colored Baptist Church of Allegheny City in 1850. It is regrettable that the names of these 20 members are not recorded anywhere.

The first pastor of the reorganized First Colored Baptist Church was M.B. Sloan, a licentiate from the Sandusky Street Baptist Association. It was recently learned that Reverend Sloan was considered "the Father of Allegheny High School." It was because of his relentlessness that the school opened as a high school at its present site. The building was previously used as a school for colored children from the time of the Civil War to 1873.

In 1869, the First Colored Baptist Church reported a total membership of 30 with the Reverend Christopher Williams as Pastor. The Sunday School showed no increase in the number of scholars."

From 1868 through 1870, the Church was still known as the First Colored Baptist Church of Allegheny City, and was represented by delegates, the Reverend C. Williams, Pastor, Wesley Johnson, and S.A. Neale.

At the 32nd Annual Session of the Pittsburgh Baptist Association held with the Sharpsburg Baptist Church on June 10th, 11th and 13th, 1871, the Church reported, "change of name from First Colored Baptist Church to Zion Baptist Church and commented that they were striving to go forward in all good works. Hoping they could to do more in the coming year. The membership totaled 42 with the Reverend Wesley Williams as Pastor. Delegates were S.A. Neale and Paul T. Caperton." The Church was without a regular pastor in 1872, depending upon the Pittsburgh Baptist Association for a preacher. Delegates were Wesley Johnson, Thomas Baltimore and S.A. Neale.

In 1873 (June 3rd and 4th) at Apollo, Pennsylvania, the Zion Colored Baptist Church reported "A membership of 71 with a new pastor, the Reverend George W. Jackson, now working in Harmony, having nearly doubled in membership and now taking measures to secure a lot upon which to build a house. The Sunday School was doing well with 73 scholars, 9 officers and teachers." The Superintendent at that time was S.A. Neale. In 1874 and 1875, the Church was "still growing under the Pastorate of the Reverend G.W. Jackson." The 1875 report indicated "the year has been one of growth. The Pastor has been faithful and diligent. Amid the general joy in the addition of souls, sorrow has filled their hearts at the conduct of some who have been cut off. Death has removed Brother Charles Joiner at the age of 92 and Sister Mary Melontree, 51; W.A. Fox, age 22; and Doley Queen, age 72. Pray for us."

Under the leadership of the Reverend George W. Jackson, a permanent place of worship was secured on Green Street. The Green Street M.E. Church conveyed to the Green Street Baptist Church a church building at Spring Alley and Green Street for the sum of \$6,500.00. (Recorded on page 458, Vol. 363 of the charter book in the Recorder's Office of Allegheny County.) Note: Negotiations has started in 1873.

The Charter of Incorporation of the Green Street Baptist Church was

granted on August 14, 1875. Signatures on the charter included James Harper, Edward Williams, Basel Rideout, Archibald Epps Branch, and Henry Tolliver. It is to be noted that "all communicant members of said church shall be members of said corporation, and all persons subscribing and paying into the fund of said church or corporation the amount of twenty-five dollars annually shall be eligible as members of said corporation." (Recorded on page 131, 132, Volume 5 of the charter book, Recorder's Office of Allegheny County.)

In 1876, the total membership of 153 reported to the Pittsburgh Baptist Association 37th Annual Session at McKeesport, Pennsylvania, the Reverend G.W. Jackson, formerly of Washington, D.C., Pastor. "Have had uninterrupted peace and union. The Holy Spirit has been with them. Entered new house of worship in August 1875. Pastor zealous in every good work. Two mission schools. Two mission stations. Need help to pay for house and lot. Have changed name from Zion to Green Street Baptist Church. Two have died, one age 82 and other 72."

The years of 1877-79 were years of struggle. At the 1877 Annual Session, the Reverend G.W. Jackson reported a membership of 134. "Services have been interesting and profitable. Earnest and faithful work had been done in the Church and Sabbath School. Church struggling under financial embarrassment, having a heavy debt on their church building. Ask brethren to pray for them."

At the 39th Annual Session held with the Sandusky Street Baptist Church June 5th and 6th, 1878, the report was: "Reverend G.W. Jackson has labored faithfully at a small salary. Has not enjoyed much of the spirit of peace – many members having seceded from the body, leaving the membership small. Among those who remain, peace and harmony prevail. School small, total membership equals 92." This apparently represents the split that left to organize the Tabernacle Baptist Church July 4, 1878.

1879 - "still struggling to hold up the banner of Christ."

1880 - "membership dwindled to 68. School small. Grateful for many blessings received."

1881 – "membership holding at 68, are contending for the faith in peace and harmony with each other. Reverend G.W. Jackson resigned the pastorate. The Reverend I. Lafayette accepted a call from us and entered his work in January last. Are meeting in rented hall. Hope to make an effort to secure a house of worship. The difficulty existing last year with the Tabernacle Church is unsettled. School prospering." Legend has it that a flood forced the Church to move to a rented hall.

The Reverend I Lafayette only served a short while before the Church called the Reverend Willis Duvall in 1883. He immediately appointed a committee with John Admas as Chairman to locate a site for the Church.

In 1884, a lot was purchased on Perry Street, Allegheny City, at a cost of \$1,300.00. The report to the Pittsburgh Baptist Association in 1884 said "Are still moving onward. Have made payment on lot, and met current expenses."

1885 - "Having enjoyed weekly preaching by Pastor W. Duvall. Are grateful for many blessings received."

1886 - "When the Reverend Duvall resigned in 1886 to labor in the East

End of Pittsburgh, the Church licensed brother Patrick Robinson to preach until a call was extended to the Reverend T. H. Braxton, who pastured six months."

At the 1888, Annual Session, Green Street Church reported, "commenced work Robinson Street and Gray's Alley and help services in March 1888 although it is not yet finished. January was supplied by brother J.J. Jones, a licentiate of Second Baptist Church, Washington, D.C. who was ordained by the [] April 11th, and is now settled as pastor. Mourn the loss by the death of Brother Daniel Truehart age 76. Have reorganized school."

In 1888-89, the Church was quite prosperous under the labor of Pastor J.J. Jones. "Financial condition was greatly improved... still reducing debt on property and making further improvements."

The Reverend Jones left in March 1890 and the Church was served by a Reverend Hugh Fields for a short period.

The Reverend R.S. Laws was called late in 1890.

At the 1891 Annual Session the minutes read, "Grateful to God for many mercies received. Are now free from debt on Church property that had a seating capacity of 250 and at a cost of \$4,000.00 the indebtedness reported last year having been paid. Church and school are prospering under the leadership of Pastor Laws."

"Being fully convinced that the Colored Baptists can be better operated separately as a body than they can together with the whites, we ask for letters of dismission." The report of the committee on application for letters of dismission made to the Annual Session of the Pittsburgh Baptist Association in 1891 states, "that four black churches (Siloam, Green Street, Tabernacle and Second Braddock) requested letters [of] dismission to organize and enter into an Association of their own." Thus began the Allegheny Baptist Association, which later became Allegheny Union Baptist Association.

Reverend Laws resigned in 1895 and a Reverend J.W. Bell served as Pastor for one year.

On December 1, 1896, a call was extended to the Reverend A.M. Lewis of Columbus, Ohio. He was a great financier as well as outstanding gospel preacher. During his pastorate, the Church sold its property and place of worship because it was in the flood area. (This was the second move from the flood area.) Part of this property, included a lot situate on Robinson Street and Morgan, the 4th Ward of the City of Allegheny that Lee Trent and his wife, Sarah Trent, deeded to the Church on March 15, 1904. (Recorded DB Volume 117, page 47.)

The Committee chosen to find a new site for the Church consisted of Noah Carter (Chairman), Charlie Johnson, Frank Lampkin, Edward Hill, William Wiley, William Starks, Jim Hill, Nelson Wiley, Brother Woody, A.B. Carrington, and Robert Elliot. The new site selected was on higher ground on Sampson Street (now Sampsonia Street). Attorney Wendell Stanton assisted in this transaction.

Legend has it that in 1903, the land was sold to Noah Carter for the purpose of building a laundry. The cost of the lots was \$6,500.00 A splendid edifice was erected thereon at a cost of \$30,000.00. On January 29, 1904, the Green Street Baptist Church changed [its] name to the

Metropolitan Baptist Church of Allegheny City. On November 1, 1904, the property was deeded to the Metropolitan Baptist Church. Signatures on the deed included Noah Carter and his wife, Alice S. Carter, A.M. Lewis (Pastor) and his wife, Annie L. Lewis. (Recorded in DB Volume 1351, pages 437, 438 and 439 in the Recorder's Office, Allegheny County.)

The Church was ready for occupancy in 1905. The Honor Roll of the Green Street members who marched into the present edifice included:

The Reverend A.M. Lewis lived only a short time after the dedication of the new Church. He died in November 1906.

Then followed the Reverend W.R. Moses who pastured for a short while until the Reverend J.H. Holder was called in 1907. Under his pastorate, the membership grew to be one of the largest in the city. One of the outstanding members was the former Mother of the Church, the late Mrs. Iona M. Richardson.

The next minister was the Reverend W.R. Brown of Roanoke, Virginia who is credited with having served as Pastor for 19 years, the longest period in the history of this Church. During this time, the Church purchased a parsonage on Sandusky Street, North Side, added an expensive pipe organ, and paid off the mortgage on June 17, 1926. The Junior Church was organized with Mrs. Alice B. Carter as Director and the Metro Dramatic Club with Paul Willis as President.

In 1935, a call was extended to the Reverend Clarence Miller Smith of Canton, Ohio. The Sisterhood was organized by Mrs. Fannie B. Scott and the Brotherhood was organized by Deacon Jacob Bailey. He resigned after a two-year pastorate to accept a call in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The Reverend James Wesley Parrish of Port Chester, New York accepted a call on March 4, 1938 and was installed on July 10, 1938. The Metropolitan Scholarship Fund was organized with Deacon W.R. Wiley as Chairman and the Gospel Chorus with Mrs. Clara Bailey as Director. Reverend Parrish resigned after serving seven years to accept a call to the Shiloh Baptist Church in Columbus, Ohio.

On September 19, 1945, the Reverend Samuel L. Spear of Johnson City, Tennessee became Pastor. Rev. Spear resigned in 1954 to assume pastorate of the Ebenezer Baptist Church of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The Reverend Obadiah Simms of Newport News, Virginia became Pastor in February 1956. In 1968, Reverend Simms resigned to accept that call to the First Baptist Church of Glen Cove, New York.

In august 1969, the Reverend Dudley D. Chatman of Monessen, Pennsylvania became Pastor and remained until 1979.

Our present Pastor, Reverend Lacy F. Richardson, Ph.D., came to us in June 1981 from Wilmerding, Pennsylvania.

Reverend is a devoted and diligent servant of God, inspiring us with his sermons and a determination to unite the membership in one bond of love and respect for one another. Membership in one bond of love and respect for one another Membership has almost doubled. Reverend Richardson organized the Greeters, reorganized the membership to make Metropolitan Baptist Church responsive to the needs of its members and the community. He also has encouraged members to become active in a missionary circle, adopt prayer partners, and regularly attend Mid-week Prayer Service and Weekly Bible Study class.

The nest phase of major buildings began in 1982 and continued to 1985. It included the construction of an extension to the edifice, which moved the main sanctuary to ground level and re-installed the baptistery into its proper place with a mural painted by the Pastor; a balcony was established and stained glass windows were installed. Off the sanctuary, men's and women's restrooms, a lounge, and a handicapped accessible ramp were constructed. A floor to ceiling glass entry enclosure, lighting and air conditioning, a wooden ceiling and sound system with recording capability were added as well. On the lower level, the kitchen, pantry and fellowship room was remolded including new lights and fans. Old pipes and plaster were removed and the ceiling was renewed with tile. The old sanctuary was dismantled to make room for an office suite for the Pastor, the clerical staff and the Church Officers, as well as a meeting room and robe room for the Music Department. Outside, a garden area was landscaped, the parking lot was covered with asphalt and an outdoor bulletin board was installed. The \$250,000 indebtedness was satisfied in January 1986 and the burning of the mortgage was celebrated on April 10, 1986.

The next phase of major capital improvements and acquisitions involved the fellowship room where insulation, plastering and lighting in the new suspended ceiling were installed; the upper floors of the Church were carpeted, and the entire Church was painted. Reverend Richardson installed a Baldwin upright grand piano, a Hammond organ, and a Roland digital piano and acquired a 15-passenger van.

We have had a center for distribution of surplus food, a day care center, a collection center for clothing for persons in distressed areas, a Head Start program, and adult classes to teach reading and writing, and boy and girl scout troops. We have a Benevolent Fund that dispenses to the needy and provides tax assistance to senior citizens, a continuous voter registration campaign, a scholarship fund, and a Board of Christian Education that holds workshops and training classes, as needed.

We are proud to acknowledge that we have descendants of charter members as current members of our congregation. Mr. James Scott is the son of Mrs. Frannie B. Scott; her grandchildren include Deaconess Carolyn Mundy, Mrs. Joanne Stotts, and Mrs. Clara Longmire, her great grandchildren are Ms. Evon Longmire and Miles and Mrs. Stephanie Herriott. Mrs. Birchard Jennings, daughter of founders Noah and Alice Carter passed away in July 2000...

Members of Metropolitan Baptist Church celebrate the 170th anniversary by sharing their stories, remembering the pioneers who came before them—and celebrating their legacy and influence today.

William "Butch" Burton

The story of the joining of the Richardson family and Metropolitan began with my grandmother, Iona Moten, and her sister Stella, who came to Pittsburgh from Indianapolis, Indiana as children. They joined the church as teenagers around 1910. Although Stella eventually married and moved to Detroit, Iona remained a loyal and active member of the church, singing in the choir and eventually marrying William Henry Richardson who had moved to Pittsburgh from Ohio. William and Iona were blessed with 3 beautiful daughters: Martina, Marye, and Helen (tragically, their 4th daughter, Henrietta, passed away as an infant). The girls attended Metropolitan their entire lives (Martina, at 98, is still a member). All the Richardsons were active in the church, serving on the Usher Board, as missionaries, or singing in the choir. William served on the Board of Trustees for many years.

Martina, Marye and Helen continued to attend services while attending and graduating from the University of Pittsburgh (Martina - Sociology, Marye - Biology, Helen - education) and beginning their careers. All would marry.

After marrying, Marye had me - William ("Butch") and Helen had a son - Theodore ("Teddy'). Teddy and I were also raised in Metropolitan, attending Sunday School and church under Reverend Simms, causing mischief and running around the church with our friends like we owned the place and were baptized as teenagers by Reverend Chatman.

Mrs. Burks was a Sunday School teacher for a class of young ladies. She appointed Mrs. Coleman, a stranger and new to the church, to be her assistant in her class. They became good friends and went everywhere together. She became Mrs. Coleman's second mom.

Mrs. Fannie Scott loved the two boys, David and Jesse. She was the den mother of a Boy Scout troop and kept the boys busy. Mrs. Coleman recounts: Those were some happy days. Things were great. Children respected their parents. The church was involved in many things. There were teas, rummage sales, bake sales and dinners, all fundraisers for the church. Churches visited each other. It was wonderful being a Christian and a member of Metropolitan Baptist Church.

Over the years, Mrs. Coleman has had many roles in the growth of Metropolitan Baptist Church. She has dutifully served as a Sunday school teacher, Superintendent of the Youth Department, member of the Usher Board and Alice B Carter Missionary Department, and has held every office in the Metropolitan Nurses Corps. At the age of 108, she is the senior lady in our Church and a member of the Mother's Court. She was an active member of the Western Region's Ministry, board member of The Pennsylvania Baptist State Convention and former president of the State Nurses Corps.

Mrs. Coleman was married to the late Jesse E Coleman, Sr. and raised her family with strong Christian beliefs, proudly watching Jesse Sr., sons David and Jesse Jr., daughter Teresa and grand-daughter Kymberly accept CHRIST and be baptized in the church's baptismal pool.
